Progress: Preserving What We Have By Rick Hoppe, City Administrator

City expenditures tend to fall into two categories: taking care of what we already have and investing in new amenities or projects. Both are important to a community. The challenge is finding the resources for both.

We have had a great year balancing these priorities. Our new investments in the Hinge Project continue to pay off and we have put greater emphasis on repairing and replacing what we already have.

Streets must be consistently maintained as they become more expensive to fix the longer they aren't addressed. Concrete panels must be replaced as they become damaged or the risk for even greater damage increases. Unfortunately, it is an expensive process and the City has not done panel replacement for the past several years. But thanks to prudent budgeting, we were able to investment about \$200,000 in 10 panel replacements across the City. Some are already completed and others will be happening in the coming months. While we have a great deal more to do, this represents tremendous progress on streets.

Tight budgets have also impacted repair and replacement in our parks and trails. A good example is the Serum Avenue trail bridge, which has been closed for two years. Now, thanks to re-prioritizing our resources, the trail bridge is scheduled to be repaired this fall.

The City received an offer from a business to purchase the Serum Avenue soccer fields. The fields have not been used as much as in the past, so the City decided to put them up for bid. That resulted in an \$800,000 offer that will dramatically impact a number of Parks projects. In addition to the trail bridge, we will be able to address failing retaining walls at the Ralston Park ballfields. We are also reviewing what playground equipment needs replacement and assessing repair needs at all facilities. We are also reserving some of the funding to replace the

soccer fields so our youth soccer teams still have a nice place to play.

Paying down debt has been a major focus of our budget efforts in 2020-21. Our plans to reduce debt are critical to more consistently focus our resources on repair and replacement. We paid off a \$1 million line of credit this year. In addition, we just paid down \$400,000 of another \$1.8 million loan and if our revenues keep pace, we should be able to pay it off completely in the 2021-22 budget. Our goal is to increase Ralston's bond rating. A bond rating is essentially a credit rating for the City. If we improve our credit score, we will receive more favorable interest rates on our outstanding bonds. Refinancing bonds will free up revenues to pay for street repairs, fixing parks, and better maintaining what we already have.

It is exciting to watch the new Hinge Flats project rise from the ground. The steel girders on Main Street that will support a 27-foot LED screen for the new Granary Green demonstrate the success of our public-private partnership in redeveloping the Granary site. While the City will continue to invest in those projects that build our economy and create jobs, we are also strongly focused on the fundamentals like streets and parks that ensure a high quality of life.

Taking care of what we have. Investing in our future. Ralston is truly on the move.

Our Finance Director, Tim Bohling, has been a strong leader on the budget and a passionate advocate for the investments discussed in this article. He has been a major force in the amazing run of success our community has enjoyed over the past couple years. Tim is taking on a new challenge in Florida and moving closer to his family. He will be missed. Thanks for everything, Tim.

All building, plumbing, electrical, sign, and contractor permits and licenses must be filed with the City of Ralston through the Community Development Coordinator's office at 7305 Main Street, located south of the Ralston Police Department.

For your convenience, you may apply for the permit online by visiting: https://ci-ralston-ne.smartgovcommunity.com/Public/Home

You can also pay the permit fees online.

Permits are required for most projects.

All submissions are subject to review by the City of Ralston. You will be notified when your application has been approved or if additional action is required.
